From the Reed Desk of Dr. Marchioni

Happy New Year! I hope your 2016 has already been filled with great music and fulfilling projects. Congratulations to all of you who have students accepted to the KMEA All-State ensembles!

This is possibly opening a can of worms, but I wanted to take the opportunity to address a question I am often asked about the embouchure for the beginning oboist. We could spend hours talking about this, but here is my best quick advice.

First, the most ideal embouchure comes from a position similar to that of whistling. The lips and front of the face come forward, the chin and jaw are down, and the lips are pursed. Once you firm the skin on the lips and place the reed at the center, you only need to roll in enough to cover the reed. The lips do not need to be tucked fully under the teeth (and often this can be difficult for students switching from other woodwind instruments. There should be no upward pressure (or biting) from the jaw and very little manipulation from note-to-note within the lips.

Secondly, the reeds must allow the student to play with this mouth position. Nearly all factory manufactured reeds are very flat with a wild tone, therefore inherently not allowing any oboist -- student or professional!! - to play

with the correct embouchure. More than anyone, I understand that finding good reeds for your students can be a frustrating and daunting proposition. Luckily, I can help you! Please be in touch for help with this or any other issue! marchioni.oboe@uky.edu
