Student Spotlight Dane Bennett Sophomore Oboe Performance Major

Sophomore Oboe Performance Major Dane Bennett is from Worland, Wyoming and a graduate of Worland High School. A dedicated, hard-working, and motivated student, Dane was a valued member of the UK Symphony Orchestra his freshman year. In 2018, he was a semi-finalist at the first annual Donald Runnicles Musical Arts Competition at the Grand Teton Festival.

Q: You get the award for the UK Oboe Student furthest from home. How did you even choose to study at UK?

Having grown up in a very small town, I always wanted to experience somewhere new and go out of state for college. I started with a super lengthy process of researching colleges with great music and science programs. As the list got smaller and smaller, I ended up visiting a few different schools. Out of the universities I visited, UK was the special college that gave me the gut feeling of "I need to go here!" I am very glad that I trusted my instincts on this decision.

Q: We understand your town in Wyoming is high altitude, over 4,000 ft sea level. Can you tell us how this impacts your reeds and what it's like to deal with reed-making at different altitudes?

Juggling big altitude changes is a huge challenge. Reeds that I finish in Lexington usually don't vibrate at all back in Wyoming. However, reeds I make in Wyoming usually become much easier to play on when I come back to Lexington. If I am going

back to Wyoming, it is usually easier to start fresh and make new reeds. Since I have to scrape a lot more at altitude, I make sure to leave reeds slightly under pitch and with a little extra cane to prevent them from becoming too sharp. Once I get into Lexington, it just takes a little refining and I'm all set!

Q: What is your best advice for a new freshmen for developing time management skills?

It took some time to get into a routine, but using a planner religiously made life much more manageable for me. This kept me accountable for what I needed to do and helped me to plan ahead. Also, setting a regular sleeping schedule and sticking to it as much as possible is very important. Don't panic if you can't do all your homework in one day, but just focus on what you need to do first and take it one step at a time.

Q: Tell us about your summer activities.

My summer started off with the UKSO trip to Carnegie Hall. That was the experience of a lifetime! Afterwards, I started up at my summer job working on a cleaning crew in a factory. Not as fun as Carnegie Hall! These last two weeks, I got to escape from work and attend the Decoda Skidmore Chamber Music Institute! It was an amazing opportunity to work with the phenomenal members of Decoda. In addition to working on community outreach, speaking from the stage, and creating educational and interactive performances, I was put into two chamber ensembles with students much further in their studies than I



am. Getting to work with more experienced people is a great opportunity to broaden my horizons!

Q: What are you most excited about for the coming school year?

I am most excited about coming back to school and making a lot more growth on the oboe. My freshman year completely transformed my playing, and I can't wait to see how much more I'll improve in another year.

Q: If you could have any color reed thread, it would be...

dark green or purple! Those always give me the best reeds.

Q: What is your favorite thing about the UK Oboe Studio?

How much of a family we are. We are all really close and always have a good time. We look after one another and make sure each of us are at our best. The studio is my home away from home!


